## Rules:

- r. 5 - i and y usually say /i/ (big, gym), but may say /i/ (si lent, my, type)
- r. 6 - y, not i, is used at the end of English words (my, by)
- r. 9 - 1-1-1 rule: One-syllable words with one vowel and ending with one consonant need another final consonant before adding a suffix that begins with a vowel (hop + ed = hop ped)
- r. 13 - sh is used at the beginning or end of a base word (she, she), at the end of a syllable (fin sh), but never at the beginning of a syllable after the first syllable except for the suffix -ship (worship, friendship)
- r. 17 - double l, f, and s when following a single vowel at the end of a one-syllable word (will, off, miss)
- r. 25 - ck may only be used after a single vowel that says /ă/, /ë/, /ī/, /ō/, or /ü/ (back, neck, lick, rock, duck)
